Rationale: With globalization and technological innovation, particularly in information technology and communication, we are all confronted with a drastically changing environment. Innovation plays an essential part in coping with this context. Japan is creative in exploring new avenues to meet challenges such as the management of energy resources, the decreasing birthrate, an ageing population, the adjustment of the economic growth model. The country maintains a very significant research base and remains a powerful and innovative economy. Japan thus offers all the ingredients to become – or rather, become again – an inspiration for manufacturers, operators of international relations in the fields of S&T, universities and Grandes Ecoles, research institutions, R&D clusters, or European investors. There are many successful cooperation agreements in place between Japan and France, and between Japan and Europe, and there are many good reasons for developing new ones.

This seminar will first address the challenges that Japan is facing and the strategies that are deployed to meet those challenges. Three successive roundtables will then deal with some of the areas of excellence in Japan. A discussion with the audience will explore new cooperation leads between Japan and France, and more generally between Japan and Europe.
